Based on the results of the Easter worship survey, Administrative Board voted on May 12 to change our Summer worship schedule to a single combined worship service at 9:00 AM, from Sunday, June 2 thru Labor Day, Sept. 1.

The vote was unanimous following consideration of the survey. Out of 78 survey respondents, 64% were in favor of a single combined worship service. The board voted to have traditional and contemporary elements at the combined service. It will be good to worship together this summer.

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Missions Update: from the ministry of Rev. Luis Centeno of Barnabas Transformation Ministry, Philadelphia, PA

Rev. Luis Centeno of Barnabas Transformation Ministry in Philadelphia is one of the missionaries our church supports. Rev. Centeno writes the following about a mission trip his ministry is organizing. "Our mission trip this year will be to Cali, Columbia from July 3rd to the 17th. There will be thirteen graduates from our mission school that will be going with us. We will be partnering with a church who have a couple of members in this violent and drug infested community who have suffered loss of family members during a mudslide. We will be renovating the building which was damaged, and the roof collapsed so we need to rebuild it. This building is used for feeding the children of the community, and for teaching and training them in different arts. We will need around \$2600.00 to \$3000.00 to begin the restoration. Pray for our safety and provision."

Rev. Centeno will be our guest speaker on May 18 and 19, at both Saturday evening and Sunday morning services. We will dedicate the communion offering on June 2 to help fund the mission trip to Columbia, South America. Please consider giving generously to this cause.

Dear Church Family,

My name is Ann Moyer, and as many of you know, I have been commissioned as your Parish Nurse here at FUMC (also known as Faith Community Nurse). I am very excited about this new role and am very grateful for the support and confidence I have been receiving from leaders of the church and fellow members. Truthfully I was hesitant to accept this position but God made it quite clear to me that this is the path that I am to follow. He reminded me that He got me through nursing school, led me to this church, and provided the tools that I need to succeed, a wonderful mentor included! I ask for your patience as I transition into this position. I am receiving formal training and education for Faith Community Nursing in April and after that time I will be considered full-fledged.

This year will be my 35th year as a Registered Nurse. I graduated from St Joseph Hospital School of Nursing in Lancaster PA. My first job was as a medical surgical nurse in Passaic, NJ. The majority of my nursing career was spent as an Emergency Room nurse. When my children were young I worked part time and Per Diem so I was able to work in many different areas including: Same Day Surgery, Operating Room, Recovery Room, Home Health and Interventional Radiology. The past 12 years I spent mostly in Occupational Medicine but back in October I accepted a new part time position in Cardiac Rehab.

The American Nurses Association defines a Faith Community Nurse as an RN who focuses on the intentional care of the spirit as well as the promotion of whole-person health and the prevention or minimization of illness within the context of a faith community.

It is my firm belief that true health is a holistic matter. It encompasses the body, mind, and spirit. When any one of these areas is compromised it can definitely affect the other two. Having Christ in our lives is such a gift. His peace and comfort surpasses that of any other. It is so refreshing to be able to proclaim that fact openly while applying my nursing knowledge and skills!

I am going to try to make myself available between church services most Sundays and will be resuming the monthly blood pressure screening program. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or concerns.

Lord, Help Me to Love My Children Well

My son, do not forget my teaching, but keep my commands in your heart, for they will prolong your life many years and bring you peace and prosperity. Let love and faithfulness never leave you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart. Then you will win favor and a good name in the sight of God and man." Proverbs 3:1-4 (NIV)

Recently, my poor, sweet kids were each trying to navigate life alone ... ranging from an emotional teen outburst to tolerating painful behavior by classmates, and I didn't see it.

Eventually, God let me know what was happening to them. It's so like Him to bring truths about our children to light.

I discovered my kids' lonely, inner struggles in different ways: through a journal we shared, a coincidental conversation with my son's teacher, and a laundry request to remove chewing gum from a costume inflicted by a student in my daughter's play.

According to several studies, loneliness is growing. How ironic that modern technology allows us to be more socially connected than ever while making us relationally disconnected.

Well, the enemy is sneaky. It's so like him to take the phone, a tool of communication, and make it one of isolation.

Loneliness is an emotional response to isolation. It's an anxious feeling about a lack of connection or communication with others. Loneliness and isolation are strategies the enemy uses because God designed us to love and to have relationships.

Jesus made this clear: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:36-39, NIV).

Love God and love your neighbor. Love is the only way to have a relationship, and relationships are the only way to overcome loneliness. My husband and children are my closest "neighbors," and I want to love them well. I want to teach them to love well.

The secret to parenting well is to teach my kids to love well.

If I teach my kids to love well, they will never be alone. Especially in light of these reminders in God's Word:

"My son, do not forget my teaching, but keep my commands in your heart, for they will prolong your life many years and bring you peace and prosperity. Let love and faithfulness never leave you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart. Then you will win favor and a good name in the sight of God and man" (Proverbs 3:1-4).

Can effective parenting be so simple it can be summed up in just three sentences? Yes!

I must teach them that if they keep His commands in their heart, and don't let love and faithfulness ever leave them, then they will win favor and a good name in the sight of God and man.



Our Mission is to make Disciples of Jesus Christ

Disciples Love God, Love One Another and Share God's love with the World

I> A VISUAL OVERVIEW OF OUR DISCIPLESHIP PROCESS

Growing disciples of Christ through the following five simple steps



II> HOW WE WILL DO DISCIPLESHIP (with measurable components):

- A. Disciples experience God through worship & prayer. As Jesus' disciples we seek to experience God regularly through corporate worship and prayer at:
 - Saturday and Sunday Spirit-Filled Worship Services
 - b. Wednesday Corporate Prayer and Ministry Night
 - c. Weekly Prayer Partners and the Prayer Chain ministry
- B. Disciples follow Jesus. As disciples, we seek to grow a personal relationship with Jesus by spending time with Him daily, learning his teachings and putting them into practice. Following him, we expect to become like him.
 - a. Through daily personal devotions
 - b. Through a Discipleship Training Program with classes on Christian essentials for all ages
 - c. Through other opportunities for study and practice
- C. Disciples enjoy life with fellow believers. Since relationship is at the heart of our faith, we envision every member will be in some type of small group where relationships in Christ are being built, group members are loved & discipleship is taking place. We envision regular opportunities for all members to come together for fellowship and mutual encouragement.
 - Through regular small group participation
 - b. By providing a Discipleship Council to help support and grow Small Group Ministry
 - c. Through regular Church-wide fellowship events, meals & fun activities
- D. Disciples serve the Body of Christ. We believe the Church is the People, the family of God. As each family member contributes for the good of a family, every member is to serve the family of God as they grow in faith, regularly sharing their natural and spiritual gifts and talents for the common good of the Body of Christ.
 - a. Disciples help take care of the various ministry needs of the Body
 - Each member is involved in some committee, ministry team and/or service role
- E. Disciples invest in others inside and outside the church, making new disciples.
 As disciples, we are committed to share God's love with the world by investing in others inside and outside the Church. We are committed to intentionally making new disciples:
 - By offering entry points for new disciples, including hospitality to visitors and by making our small groups welcoming to visitors and to new members.
 - By individual participation in outreach ministry (visitation, mission teams, etc.)
 - By each small group designing & implementing its own mission to invest in others inside or outside the church
 - d. By offering periodic Church-wide evangelism efforts like the Alpha Course

III> SOME NOTES ON OUR DISCIPLESHIP PROCESS:

- Disciples experience God through worship & prayer.
 - Saturday and Sunday Spirit- Filled worship Services
 - Including Scripture based instruction in sound doctrine, and the use of the gifts of the Holy Spirit for building up the Body of Christ
 - ii. "New wine for new wineskins": We will offer worship in culturally and generationally relevant styles
 - b. Wednesday Corporate Prayer and Ministry Night
 - i. We will continue to develop the personal and corporate prayer life of the church
 - ii. We will continue to develop Spiritual warfare & Intercession ministry
 - c. Weekly Prayer Partners and the Prayer Chain ministry

Disciples Follow Jesus.

- Through daily personal devotions
 - i. We regularly encourage each member to learn the teachings of Jesus Christ & grow in Christ-like character; to work on personal Christian growth through practicing the presence of God, faithful Scripture study, prayer, spiritual reading, confession, participation in Holy Communion & other spiritual practices, learning and practicing our Lord's teachings, participation in the Emmaus Walk.
- b. Through a Discipleship Training Program with classes on Christian essentials for all ages
 - Discipleship classes that are given in sequence and rotate: I.e., the Alpha Course, Introduction to the Spiritual Disciplines, Personal Foundations for Christian Maturity, Church History, Spiritual Gifts, Spiritual Warfare, Outreach and Evangelism Principles, Defending the Faith
- Through other opportunities for study and practice
 - Such as Sunday school offerings, Evening Bible Studies and other topical or book focused small groups
- Disciples enjoy life with fellow believers.
 - Through regular small group participation
 - Christ-centered relationship development in Small Groups: We envision everyone participating in a small group, which is our primary community connection and spiritual development method.
 - Our small group ministry will be intentionally designed to be welcoming to new members and to multiply to create new groups.
 - iii. We will offer an annual all-church small group campaign
 - iv. We will create special purpose & theme small groups to meet specific needs
 - b. By providing a Discipleship Council to help support and grow Small Group Ministry

- We will create a Discipleship Council to support and steer the Life Group Ministry.
 The Council will be responsible for leadership training. See below for details.
- We will offer a smorgasbord of small group types overseen by the Discipleship Council which all help along the way of discipleship.
- c. Through regular Church-wide fellowship events, meals & fun activities
 - i. The Fellowship Committee will organize these church-wide events.

Disciples serve the Body of Christ.

- a. Disciples help take care of the various ministry needs of the Body
 - We serve by faithful participation through our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service and our witness
 - We will have an annual all-member service assessment, with opportunities to change roles and try new things.
- Each member is involved in some committee, ministry team or service role.
 - Such as preaching, teaching, singing or helping lead worship, leading a small group, helping care for the building, focus in a specialized ministry, helping in visitation or Stephen Ministry head usher, greeter, liturgist, media booth volunteer, communion steward, etc.

Disciples invest in others inside and outside the church, making new disciples.

- By offering entry points for new disciples, including hospitality to visitors and by making our small groups welcoming to visitors and to new members.
 - We will appoint a head usher at each worship service who is responsible to help visitors feel welcome.
 - We will create a hospitality team to visit visitors on behalf of the church.
- By individual participation in outreach ministry (visitation, mission teams, etc.)
 - We will train each member to invest in others for Christ using their unique gifts and personality.
 - By inviting those we serve in outreach to come alongside and join in helping us serve
- By each small group designing & implementing its own mission to invest in others inside or outside the church
 - We encourage each small group to develop its own group ways to invest in others either inside or outside the church
- d. By offering periodic Church-wide evangelism efforts like the Alpha Course
 - We invite others to follow Jesus with us, creating regular opportunities to disciple new believers, such as the Alpha Course, seeker-sensitive small groups, planned outreaches, etc.

V> A DISCIPLESHIP COUNCIL will help support and grow our Discipleship Ministry

- 1. Purpose: To support the development of discipleship at FUMC through small groups
- Membership at least 7 persons, consisting of 6 members, one of whom shall be the chair, a staff curriculum coordinator, plus the Lay Leader and the pastor(s), ex officio with voice and vote. Each member shall be a leader or member of a small group.
- Meetings: Meets quarterly to give big-picture oversight to the Small Group ministry
 - a. Provides monthly support/supervision to small group leaders
- 4. Responsibilities:
 - a. Provides administrative oversight of small group ministry
 - Oversee the development of a Discipleship Training School which teaches the essentials of Christianity for all ages
 - Long term thinking/planning team responsible to vision & pray for discipleship ministry
 - d. Designs small groups for discipleship, openness, new members, and multiplication
 - e. Responsible to provide support for small groups and small group leaders
 - f. Responsible for leadership training and periodic recruitment of new leaders
 - g. Researches and advises on curriculum and content for small groups
 - h. Oversees annual church-wide small group campaign
 - i. Coordinates communications & advertising for small group ministry
 - Maintains the Small Group Communications Center
 - k. Works on developing a shepherding connection for all members
 - I. Responsible to do regular assessment of groups for discipleship growth & effectiveness
 - m. Goal to empower each small group to develop its own mission to invest in others
 - n. Designs a process for visitors to be plugged into small groups
 - o. Creates special opportunities to disciple new believers & create new groups
 - The Council will determine other responsibilities as needed

VIII> Evaluating our ministries by our New Discipleship Plan

- a. After the Discipleship Plan is adopted, all ministries of the church should be evaluated by asking whether each supports our model of discipleship, can be adapted to support it, or does not support the plan and should be retired. Over time, all ministries should continue to be evaluated and periodically measured for effectiveness by the standards of the Plan.
- The purpose of this evaluative work is to help us use our time and resources most efficiently to accomplish our mission.



Anne in Minneapolis had a good-paying factory job, except she didn't have sick time to care for her kids. As a mother of seven, she missed work to care for sick children just six times over the course of a year, but it was enough for her to be fired.
