The Pastor's Pen Creating a Master Plan of Discipleship for our Church

As I wrote in the last newsletter, our church leadership is working on creating a Master Plan of Discipleship for the whole church.



We have been praying daily for more of God's Kingdom to come in our midst. One result is that the Lord has brought into focus that our primary mission is to make disciples. We have many wonderful pieces of discipleship happening at our church, but we do not have a comprehensive and organized process that helps us all grow methodically as disciples. Now the Lord is leading us to create one.

Let's refresh our memory on why this is so important. Here is the Great Commission: "Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Mathew 28:18-20 NIV)

The Administrative Board received the following in its April 23 Pastor's report. This is roughly our game plan to start simplifying and focusing the church on our mission to make disciples.

SIMPLE CHURCH GAME PLAN

- I. The Purpose: to simplify the life of our church so that all our energy is devoted to fulfilling our mission: to make disciples of Jesus Christ.
- II. The Goal: to create a Master Plan of Discipleship which provides a concrete, measurable process for making disciples which will govern the life of the whole church, and then meticulously live that Master Plan out.

III. Why?

- To make the first things (our Mission) the First Things.
- To create a simple but comprehensive process to unify the Church in our Mission.
- 3) To create a disciple-making process that is applied consistently to all ages and segments of the church: children, youth, young adults, singles, couples, families, seniors, etc.

- 4) To address our over-commitment to 'good things' which do not accomplish our mission. These use up our pool of volunteer energy, thereby weakening its availability to accomplish the main mission of the church: to make Disciples.
- 5) To connect people more deeply to God and to one another and empower them to be in ministry to the world: loving God, loving one another, serving the world in Christ's name.
- 6) To enable us to do evangelism successfully and make disciples of the un-churched; to not just reach, but to disciple the next generation.

IV. PLANNING STAGES and TIMING

- Train key leadership NOW in the Simple Church Concept. Formal decision at June 25 Ad Board Mtg.
- 2) Organize a church-wide small-group campaign beginning in mid-September using the same curriculum to study Disciple-making. Ask all Sunday School classes, current small groups, and new small groups led by our Christ Servant Ministers to study this same theme for six weeks together. Prep and training in the summer.
- 3) Beginning in late October 2018, run 4-6 Wednesday Evening sessions, where all the small groups come together to design our own <u>Master Plan of Discipleship</u>. To participate, members of the congregation will need to have been in one of the preparatory small groups. The completed plan will be

formally adopted by the Administrative Board at its December 2018 meeting.

 Officially implement the Master Plan on January 1, 2019.



What's Next?

Lay Leadership will be fine-tuning the planning stages & timing and will present them for adoption at the June 23 Administrative Board meeting. I expect our big work on this will be done during the fall.

This is an exciting time as the Lord leads us into new pastures. Please pray daily for this work, and please start planning to set aside time during your weekly fall schedule to be part of one of our small groups. We expect all of them to be studying the disciple making process. We are seeking to be of one heart and mind in the Lord to do our part in fulfilling the Great Commission.

Summer Worship Schedule Change

New Summer Worship Time: Beginning Sunday, June 3 One Combined Service at 9:00 AM



At its April 27 meeting, the Administrative Board voted to change our Summer Worship schedule to a single combined worship service at 9:00 AM, from Sunday, June 3 thru Labor Day, Sept. 2.

The vote unanimous, following was consideration of the winter worship time survey. Out of 94 surveys turned in, 85% were in favor of a single combined worship service, 11% were opposed, and 4% were undecided. Administrative Board meeting was an open meeting. After the motion to change time was presented by the Worship Committee, open discussion was invited from the floor. No comments opposing the change were made. The Board therefore voted unanimously to approve the motion for a single summer service.

The combined service will bring both traditional and contemporary worship service congregants together during the summer. It will combine elements of both worship styles. It will begin at 9:00 AM in traditional fashion with prelude, hymns, scripture readings, prayers and the message. The prayer time style will vary with occasions for sharing and testimony. The offertory and closing worship will be in contemporary style led by the Praise Team, with occasional special music by others.

All worshippers are asked to wear name tags each Sunday to help us get to know each other. It will be a big blessing to have us all worshipping together during the summer.

What do I do if my child walks away from God?

The Apostle John writes at the end of his 3rd letter: "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth." (3 John 4 NIV). If your children have made a commitment to Christ and are actively living that out, you know what John means. You have no greater joy than to know that your child's soul is well, and their good future and eternal destiny assured.

But what if your child has walked away from God? No matter how hard you may have tried to instill faith and obedience into your children, they have a will of their own, and they must choose Christ for themselves. The older they get, the clearer this becomes, as they mature into their own natural identity separate from their parents. The reality is that each of us must, at some point, make our own choice to follow Jesus. As one writer put it, "No one gets into heaven on their parent's coat-tails!" Making their own faith decision is part of our children's growing up. In fact, they, like us, must discover that they need to choose to follow Jesus anew each day. Discipleship is all about the gradual process of conforming to Christ, putting his teachings into practice daily. That takes a lifetime.

What are some of the pitfalls they may face? Many children choose Christ when they are young and never leave him. But others have seeds of unbelief or rebellion that sprout up and produce a harvest later. The Christian singer and song-writer Lauren Daigle writes in her 2015 song "Come Alive,"

Through the eyes of men it seems there's so much we have lost. As we look down the road where all the prodigals have walked. One by one the enemy has whispered lies, and led them off as slaves

The world is rife with lies which seduce many young people. Others are led off by their own evil desires, which unconfessed and unrepented of, bind them and make them into slaves. Still others have hidden wounds and bitterness which damage their faith. These drive a wedge, not just between them and their parents, but between them and God. Still others have the seeds of faith planted in them, but they have yet to sprout.

What do we as parents do in the meantime? We can stay true to our own faith, continuing to walk

faithfully with God. We can pray regularly for them, including with special concentrated times of prayer and fasting. This is standing in the gap between our child and God asking for mercy, which the Bible calls "intercession." You do not know what kind of spiritual battle is being waged for your son or daughter's salvation. Your interceding prayers are part of that battle, fueling help to turn the tide in their eternal favor. To borrow a quote from that great movie, Galaxy Quest, "Never give up! Never Surrender!" Keep on praying until God tells you to stop!

On the behavioral side of things, we can continue to love them without approving of their destructive choices or unbelief.

Let's think about what that might look like. Love in the biblical understanding is not first an emotional response. Instead, love is a stance and actions oriented towards the highest good of the one being loved. There might be emotions that accompany this stance, but loving a wayward son or daughter is first about acting towards them in a way that is in their highest good. Loving them does not require us to compromise our own standards or accommodate wrong-doing.

You do not have to say, "Sure, come in our house and get drunk and take illegal drugs"! Real love will draw healthy boundaries that ensure respect and care for all persons involved, including the parents and other members of the household.

Encouragement can go a long way towards helping someone choose a better path. Love does not always point out every flaw and failing. Proverbs 19:11 says, "A person's wisdom yields patience; it is to one's glory to overlook an offense."

Jesus always provides a good model to imitate. He did not condemn the woman caught in the very act of adultery, as recorded in John 8:11. But he did declare, "Go now and leave your life of sin." Think about how he showed love to other sinners and to the rebellious, like the tax-collectors and prostitutes. He kept relationship open towards them. He ate with them and joined them at parties. He healed them. He also spoke the truth to them, calling them to repentance and offering God's grace. He walked closely with his Father and knew the right words to say at the right time to the prodigals.

As parents, we can pray that God provides teachable moments with our children and gives us just the right words to say at the right time. That might even include things like sharing bits of our own rebellious past, and why we choose Christ and the life of faith.

We can take the initiative with our straying children to right any wrongs we have done towards them. No parent is perfect, and some rebellion is fostered by hidden resentment towards one or both parents. There is a time to seek to mend broken parts of our relationships with an apology and a 'please forgive me.' Proverbs 10:12 says "Love covers over a multitude of sin."

Finally, patience. God is patient with us, not wanting anyone to perish, but for everyone to come to a knowledge of the truth. We need to imitate him, and be patient with our children, continuing to pray for them, and trusting them into God's hands. He can do in the human heart what we never can do ourselves. We need to trust him with that.

Faith Community Nurse

Have you ever wondered what a Health Community Nurse, formerly known as Parish Nurse, does? Well, he or she can do many things. First of all, the nurse must me an RN and have completed a Foundations of Parish Nursing/Faith Community Nursing course.

Faith community nurses serve in several roles, including: * Health advisor * Educator on health issues * Visitor of church members at home or in the hospital * Provider of referrals to community resources and provide assistance in obtaining needed health services * Developer of support groups within the church * Trainer and coordinator of volunteers * Provider of health screenings.

Each nurse decides what the focus is for the congregation he or she serves. Over the past 14 years I have focused on education, health screenings, health resource, and health consultant.

Our Parish Nurse program began many years ago when Mary Ann Garrett, wife of our then District Superintendent, asked to start a program here at First Church. She served for a couple of years until they were reassigned outside of the area. Next, Nancy O'Rourke served the congregation for several years. After her retirement the church was without a nurse in this role.

During strategic planning in the early 2000's the participants determined that they wanted the program to be resurrected. They found it a vital ministry for the physical and spiritual health of our members. In 2004, I felt called to answer this request. With the support of the pastor and church board, I attended a 2 week program at Shenandoah University in Winchester, Virginia, called "Foundations of Parish Nursing". This allowed me to be educated in all aspects of this nursing specialty.

I have been blessed to serve our church as a volunteer for 14 years. In January of this year I prayed for direction about my role in this ministry and other ministries I am involved in. God has shown me that it is time for me to retire from Faith Community Nursing at the end of 2018. It is my hope that this ministry will be able to continue at Schuylkill Haven First UMC. If it is God's will for this to continue, please pray that the right person will be identified and bring new energy to this program.

I thank you all for your support, especially the Health and Welfare Committee, who oversees the program and I praise God for allowing me to serve Him in this way.

A Moment in Time

The moment of decision is drawing closer for The United Methodist Church. For many months, we have awaited the plan(s) the Council of Bishops (the "COB") will recommend to the special called General

Conference to resolve the irreconcilable differences that divide the UM Church. Our *Book of Discipline* has been clear about our sexual ethics, definition of marriage and ordination standards for 46 years. Repeated attempts have been made by some to change these clear provisions. While other Protestant churches wholly based in the United States have made changes, the UM Church has not done so in part because of our international membership. The most recent efforts to change our church's positions in 2016 were defeated in legislative committee. Essentially the same delegates will be present at the special called General Conference to be held from February 23-26, 2019.

The current crisis in the UM Church is not a result of a lack of clarity in our church's position. The current crisis is the result of the failure of some of our bishops to administer the clear provisions of our *Discipline* and the blatant defiance and disobedience of segments of the UM Church, particularly in the United States. Those bishops who have abdicated their responsibilities and those clergy who are engaged in disobedience have engaged in schismatic actions that have resulted in chaos in our church. As significant as our disagreements within the church are with respect to our sexual ethics, definition of marriage and ordination standards, such disagreements, however, are only presenting symptoms of deep theological divisions within the church.

In this environment, the Commission on a Way Forward (the "COWF") has held seven meetings. They have submitted a preliminary report to the COB and soon will submit their final report. The COB has held two meetings devoted to receiving the preliminary or interim report from the COWF and interacting with the COWF. The COB has announced that it will issue its final recommendation on how it proposes that the church resolve this crisis when it concludes its spring meeting to be held from April 29 to May 4. Legislation to implement this final recommendation must be in the hands of the Secretary of General Conference not later than July 8, 2018. Presumably legislation with alternative proposals on how to structure the UM Church as we move forward will be submitted by others as well. The Wesleyan Covenant Association (the "WCA") is involved in the development of such alternative proposals to affirm the historic, orthodox positions of the church, and in preparing for other possible outcomes.

The most recent meeting of the COB concluded on February 28. Not surprisingly, the COB is focused on preserving the UM Church as an institution. That is their charge and it would be astonishing for them to act contrary to that charge, even if such a response was prudent. The COWF has offered the COB three sketches – 1) maintaining the current provisions of our Discipline with enhanced accountability, 2) a local option that would allow annual conferences to develop their own sexual ethics, definition of marriage and ordination standards, and 3) a multibranch model which would divide the church into theologically distinct branches operating under an overarching umbrella.

The COB has indicated it is no longer considering sketch one. This sketch reaffirms the UM Church's sexual ethics, definition of marriage, and ordination standards – teachings grounded in Scripture, consistent with two thousand years of church history, and held in common with nearly all Christians worldwide. Our teachings are rooted in statements adopted by the 1972 General Conference, and have been reaffirmed at thirteen subsequent conferences. Sketch one would preserve the unity of the church by uniting the denomination around its established sexual ethics, definition of marriage and ordination standards. For the sake of church unity, it also adds additional accountability standards so clergy and bishops who violate them are held liable for their defiance. In short, sketch one calls the church to a unity grounded in Scripture, the orthodox teachings of the faith, and our Wesleyan expression of it. *But apparently, the majority of our bishops think otherwise*.

To date, they have not explained why they have removed this option from the table. They have not demonstrated how our sexual ethics, definition of marriage, and ordination standards are unbiblical, nor have they explained how they arrived at their new understanding. They have not provided any reason why the UM Church should deviate from two thousand years of Christian history and why it should launch forth in a new, uncharted direction. And they have not articulated why the UM Church should align with dying denominations that have adopted teachings at odds with the vast majority of Christians worldwide.

What they have done is demonstrate to the church why we are at this crossroads – a failure of leadership by many of those selected by the church to administer its teachings and polity.

The WCA is committed to upholding our sexual ethics, definitions of marriage and ordination standards for the simple reason that they are grounded in Scripture and the historic teachings of the faith. Regardless of the recommendation of the COB, we will contend for this position through legislation submitted to the special called 2019 General Conference. Should the UM Church abandon its current sexual ethic, definition of marriage and ordination standards, the WCA will provide a home for laity, clergy and churches committed to what has been historically taught and believed by Christians in all times and in all places.

In three forthcoming articles, we will address the two options which the COB is currently considering and share about our vision for the coming months.

Now is not a time for anxiousness, hand-wringing, resignation or defeat. Now is the time for us to redouble our efforts to contend for the faith entrusted to us by the saints. The WCA will continue to work tirelessly for the historic Christian faith in the Wesleyan tradition. We welcome those of like commitment.






