
The Pastor's Pen

Our Church's New
Discipleship Process to
be Designed in Jan-Feb
2019 with Input from
Entire Congregation



Dear Congregation.

Our church leadership is preparing to create a new disciple-making process to govern the life of the church. The purpose of this work is to help us more effectively fulfill our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ. We are including the whole congregation at key points in the design process.

Why is this work so important? The King of Kings did not come down into creation to do a one-man show and then depart. He came to rebuild the family of God. Messiah Jesus does not call people to just be spectators on his life. He calls us to follow and imitate him in love: to be his disciples. It is only his disciples who experience the joys of God's family, who are given the secrets of the Kingdom, the keys to eternal life, and the blessings of a life lived in God now. The main purpose of the church is to make disciples. Being a church member without being a disciple is like trying to be a member of the baseball team without ever playing baseball. Similarly, just going to church does not automatically make us disciples, any more than going to the ballpark makes us baseball players.

To be sure, worshipping God together as a body is a vital part of discipleship. But there is much more to following Jesus. It's about relationships! Disciples of Jesus are growing in relationships with each other in love as they follow and obey the Master.

Our church leadership gets this. They realize that our main mission as a church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ who are growing in love of God, one another and their neighbors. If we are not doing that main thing as the main thing in our church's life, we are missing the boat. Worse, we will be found not doing the will of God.

To be intentional about this and to make sure it happens, we are devoting a great deal of time, talent, energy, study, preparation and commitment to creating the New Discipleship Plan. This is the main purpose of our Fall Small Groups: to prepare in advance by studying discipleship. We ask members to go through discipleship training for the same reason you ask baseball-players to go through baseball training and practice. If they don't get the training, they won't even

know how to play the game, much less be any good at it. On this foundation we can build a healthy discipleship model in the new year.

Some members have expressed feeling excluded from this work by the original format of the campaign. Because the whole congregation will be impacted by the plan, our church leadership has responded by adjusting the process to include the entire congregation at key points along the way, while still respecting the work of those who committed to the Fall study campaign. Here's how it's going to work. The Administrative Board passed the following planning schedule at its Oct. 15 meeting.

Schedule to Create the Discipleship Plan

The Discipleship Plan will be created during seven consecutive Wednesday nights in January and February 2019. There is room for a snow cancellation. Even if you are not in one of the small groups this fall, there is now room for your input in the process.

- Stage 1: Three Wednesdays: Jan 9, 16, 23:
 The entire congregation is invited on these nights to give input on discipleship, our current ministry and visioning for the future.
- 2) Stage 2: Four Wednesdays: Jan 30, Feb 6, 13, 20: Ad Board members with help from the Small Group Campaign participants will gather to process the findings of Stage 1 and work on a draft Discipleship process for our church.
- 3) Stage 3: Late February-mid March: The Lay Leadership Committee will collate the results of the work and present a draft Plan to the Administrative Board. The draft Plan will be presented to the entire congregation for comment.
- 4) Stage 4: Mid-to-late March (Date TBD): The Administrative Board will meet in special open session in March 2019 to invite direct comments and suggestions from the entire congregation on the Draft Plan
- 5) Final Approval of The Plan. Based on all input, Ad Board will amend and finalize the Plan and vote on the completed version. Once approved by the Ad Board, the Discipleship Plan will become the operational mission guide and policy of First United Methodist Church.

Please note: If you have not had a chance to join one of the small groups this fall, we hope to offer the same opportunity through new groups in the Spring.

The Pastor's Report to 2018 Charge Conference

The Report was presented to the Charge Conference on October 23, 2018.

Greetings, in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. Praise God, this year First United Methodist Church celebrates its 116th anniversary. It is my privilege to serve here as pastor, now in my 14th year! I want to use this report to celebrate some of our blessings and victories, name some of our challenges and thank groups and individuals for their good work this past year.

It's a joy to report that we took into professing membership 9 youth through confirmation and 9 new adult members through transfer or profession of faith through the new members class. We had 9 of our members join the church triumphant. We continue to seek the Lord through organized daily "prayer by pairs," and our weekly prayer service is growing. We continue to pray for more of God's Kingdom to come. The Prayer Shawl ministry blessed many people with prayer shawls, including my own family for my father-in-law with Parkinson's disease.

Last year, we began to sense the Lord leading us to focus on our mission locally. We worked through an extensive investigation into local mission's outreach possibilities, which served a vital role in inspiring us to begin preparing a Master Discipleship Plan for the church. Thanks to Jerry Bowman, Paul and Irene Tomchik, April Bergen, Linda Olsen, Raquel Fisher, JoAnn Daum and Rimi Xhemajli for the extra effort they put into that work.

To prepare for the discipleship plan, we organized and started the church-wide Small Group Campaign. We currently have 18 or more functioning small groups, including the 13 groups of the small group campaign, the Thursday Bible study group, two Wesley/Barnabas accountability groups, the men's breakfast club and the Young Adult Fellowship group. We continue to prepare for congregational and leadership strategic planning sessions in winter 2019 which will create our church's new discipleship process.

Christian Education under April Bergen organized a community outreach VBS this summer which brought several new faces to the church, some of whom have begun attending youth group. Our CE Committee is experimenting with a new format for children's Sunday School. The Saturday Night worship service continued in 2018 with new worship leadership by John Fatora (Patty assisting!) with continued support from our lay and appointed preachers. It seems to be

growing. Mercy Fisher did a great job as our Summer Vocational Intern, leaving behind not just the blessing of her labor including for VBS, young adult ministry and the Girls Singing Group, but some beautiful and lasting artwork in the church building. Becky Sausser continues to prepare for ordination as a declared candidate for ministry. Ralph Saunders is a certified candidate serving as a local pastor. Matheau Bridges handed out hundreds of bibles in Street Evangelism.

The Church supported numerous missions and missionaries through its annual giving overseen by the Missions Committee. Several of our lay preachers are providing preaching ministry to sister churches in Schuylkill County, including Brian Reading, Doug Esposito, and Moffette Tharpe. Though Rev. Mike Smith is technically not one of our 'members,' I mention him because he's been attending our church for some time with his wife Nancy in retirement, and he also helps preach out there. We can celebrate that Doug O'Connell and Tim Snyder have and/or are serving in Kairos Prison Ministry; and Lenny M Yennialitus, Kevin Lord, April Bergen, Julie Saunders and Ellen Marino are all serving in the Emmaus Walk ministry.

Our Stephen Ministry led by Lynne O'Connell and Nancy Kraft continues to grow and our Stephen Caregivers are helping many individuals. Our shut-ins, nursing home and hospitalized members are cared for by our Minister of Visitation Brian Reading and several lay volunteers, including Vicky Brink and Jean Twardzik, Pam Setlock and Gary & JoAnn Daum. We continue to provide facilities for AA and other community organizations like the Exerettes, run by Jan Dunkling, Dot Murphy, and Irene Pfieffer. Our worship services have been full of the Spirit, and our music ministers, lay preachers, and praise leaders have all helped bless us with their ministry. Thank you to Julie and Cindy, Dwight, Kathy, Ray and Jason and the Choir for leading us in song and worship. Thank you also to Sandy Berger for overseeing the Acolyte Ministry.

We continue to serve the community faithfully with the Vineyard Food Pantry led by Kathy Hackman, the Community Lunch led by Lenny Yenialitus, the annual SAM/ARC Christmas Party, and the annual Father-Daughter Dance and other fellowship events led by Barb Brady and Ruth Noecker and the Fellowship Committee team. United Methodist Women continue to meet and prepare for the future under Jean Twardzik's leadership.

We also improved, renewed, upgraded and/or remodeled many parts of the church building, including the offices and kitchen, Sunday school room carpets, Christian Ed room, lighting, painting, and some new air-conditioner units. Many thanks to the Trustees and Trustee President Randy Helwig and their helpers for their labors and to those who gave to make these upgrades and refurbishments possible. Thank you to Kristy Kraft and her team of decorators.

This year we have also had some challenges. Several families left the church for various reasons, including not feeling connected, getting their feelings hurt, needing something in ministry that they felt they were not getting at our church, and not agreeing with the direction of ministry we believe the Lord has been leading us. We had a nice time worshipping together in a single service during the summer, but attendance has not picked back up in the Fall when we returned to two Sunday services. We are still seeking to understand why. The Spiritual Warfare class concluded in Spring, 2018, but the warfare did not end we just became more aware of it. There have been hurt feelings lingering from past painful seasons of the church's life. There have been members who have been angry with each other, some harboring bitterness, others disappointment, and in some cases unforgiveness. Some have walked away because of these unresolved pains. Others have dealt with them and are leaving them at the cross. Some grief and healing work remain to be done. We continue to need help to walk in the way of Christ, working on restoring relationships and keeping love of God and our brothers and sisters at the heart of what we do as we make disciples.

The upside of this is that through pain, we have become far more aware of the Lord's call upon us to reach the lost, the unchurched, the broken and hurting. Our mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Some of our struggles this past year helped open our eyes to our need to focus on this mission, and our need for a new discipleship process to govern the life of the church. I look forward to following the Lord as he leads us to become more effective at disciple-making as the heart of what we do. I also pray for healing and unity in the body, so we may walk forward together in the name of Jesus.

In closing, I want to thank various groups and individuals for their exceptional work this year. Thank you to the Local Missions Outreach Planning Team under Jerry Bowman for their tireless work investigating off-site ministry opportunities and preparing us for a new discipleship vision. Thank you to our Lay Leadership team, which did great work discerning and visioning the discipleship goal for the future. Thank you to all the Small Group Leaders and participants who have embraced preparing for our

future by engaging in discipleship together this fall. I thank God for our lay preachers and Christ Servant Ministers, many of whom are leading those small groups, who are listed separately in this Charge Conference report. I thank God for those who have and are serving the church as delegates to Annual Conference. Thank you to all our Administrative Board members and chair Doug O'Connell and to the many excellent leaders and servants of all our different committees and ministries, who have faithfully served this past year leading the congregation.

Many thanks to our Lay Leader Gary Daum, who has been faithfully serving in that position now for over 12 years, preaching, serving, leading a small group, and present at so many different ministry meetings and activities to represent the congregation. Thank you to our SPR Committee under Don Bergen, which has been faithful in overseeing the staff of the church. Thank you to our Finance Committee under Lenny Y and our retired treasurer Kathy Hackman and our new treasurer Adam Kraft and stewardship leaders, who have faithfully overseen the financial life of the church. Thank you to Shirley Yennialitus who created our church's new picture directory from home with help from Ruth. I thank God for the work of our great Staff: JoAnn Daum, Pam Setlock, Brian Reading, Rev. Rimi Xhemajli, Marcy Hudock, Julie Saunders, Cindy McClelland, Adam Kraft, and April Bergen. A further thank you to JoAnn Daum and Marcy Hudock, who often help in ministries well beyond their duties as office manager and sexton. Many thanks to Nancy Kraft who is retiring after 15 years at the end of 2018 as Parish Nurse. She has been such a blessing. We owe special thanks to our outgoing Prayer Ministry chair Irene Tomchik who is retiring after 7(?) years in that role. She has done a fantastic job! Thank you to Ruth Noecker for her tireless work in communications and keeping our website updated. Thank you to Dave and Rene Williams and their children for helping so faithfully with our worship media ministry. Thank you to Tim Snyder for leading the Media booth ministry. Thank you to Rev. Rimi Xhemajli and the Youth Council for their work giving leadership to the Youth Ministry of the church. And finally, I want to thank my lovely wife, Elizabeth, who is not only my companion and confidant and great mom, but also a Sunday school teacher and counselor for many brothers and sisters in need.

Many thanks to all the volunteers and staff who served the Lord and their neighbors with love in these ministries. There are so many others who need thanking, I'm sure I'm going to miss some names.

Forgive me if I have. May He bless and refresh you everyone.

I thank the Lord for the opportunity to serve him here at our Church. My family and I are blessed to be here. Please also pray for me, that I may be more and more effective in ministry and boldly proclaim the gospel, as I should, and have the shepherd's heart of our Great Shepherd himself, and follow his lead always. I look forward to the future, as we forget what lies behind and strain toward what is ahead, pressing on toward the prize in Christ Jesus our Lord. May he strengthen and bless us all and fill us with his grace!

ABOUT THE LION & LAMB SCULP-TURE

The sculpture of the Lion the Lamb which is on display in the narthex of First United Methodist Church was given by an anonymous giver to the glory of God. The inspiration for the form of the sculpture comes from two of the titles of Jesus Christ: "Lion of Judah" and "Lamb of God." The Lion symbolizes his identity as King, Conqueror and Judge. The Lamb symbolizes his identity as Priest, Sacrifice, and Redeemer. There are several hidden symbols carved on the statue as aspects of the life of Christ and these two names. These can be discovered by the diligent viewer by carefully examining the work.

The statue was sculpted by Mr. Todd Gladfelter, whose wood-carving studio is in New Ringgold. His carvings of various animals and wildlife can be seen at various locations around Schuylkill County and beyond. Mr. Gladfelter used photos and paintings of the 'lion and lamb' motif with theological advice on Christian symbols from Pastor Fisher. He also used live goats from his own flock as inspiration for the form of the sculpture. It was completed in April-May, 2018 and dedicated to the glory of God on May 27, 2018.

Dear Saints of the Most High,

As always, on behalf of our Youth Group and Young Adult Fellowship, we wanted to thank all of you for your support and prayers. These ministries, like any others, are never going to be successful if there is no unity in prayer and mutual support!

Although all seasons are special, the upcoming season is my favorite—the season of Thanksgiving, Christmas, and a New Year. Christmas, especially, is a time when we all join together in giving and loving as one great family, remembering, of course, the best gift and the best love that God gave to all of us through His Son, Jesus Christ. Through Him, we have entered into an everlasting covenant in which we become a royal people: children and saints of God. "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade" (1 Peter 3-4a). Remember, "you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy" (1 Peter 2:9-10).

Speaking of sainthood, in our current fall Youth program we are continuing to grow and rise up in the area of Christian identity—as royal princes and princesses of the King. Hence, we are in the process of learning the qualities and attitudes that come with being a royal member of God's family, such as loving yourself as God loves you, loving others as God loves them, forgiving others as God forgave you, forgiving yourself as God forgave you, experiencing and embracing the reality of royal calling by grace, walking as free royal people not as slaves shaken by principles of this passing world, becoming catalysts in the world, living in a new anointing of the grace and power of the Spirit (as exemplified in the book of Acts), etc.

"His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature, having escaped the corruption in the world caused by evil desires. For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But whoever does not have them is nearsighted and blind, forgetting that they have been cleansed from their past sins. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election. For if you do these things, you will never stumble, and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 1:4-11).

I would also like to remind all of you that, in addition to having different fun games and activities during our regular Youth meetings, this semester we are looking forward to our Nerf Night, another Youth Outreach, and the Christmas Party. Indeed, this strategy of mixing fun, relational bonding, and experiential learning has proven to be very successful in our Youth Group, not only to our own Youth but also to our guests who have been enjoying their time with us (as we have been enjoying our time with them!).

Speaking of our guests, many of these great teens come from unchurched backgrounds. So, as we want to become tools of God in order to reach out to this new generation of kids and young families who, like all of us, need to experience God's love, please be in prayer for them and for all of our Youth, Young Adults, church family at FUMC, and surrounding community of Schuylkill Haven. God always has big things planned for His kids!

Lastly, in accordance with our current church-wide small-group discipleship program, we are praying and working toward further restructuring our Youth Group (for more effective ministry). Hence, I invite all Youth parents, Youth Leaders, and Youth Council members to attend a special meeting on Wednesday, November 14th from 6-7:30 pm to discuss and vote on this matter. 

Acknowledge your feelings. If someone close to you has recently died or you can't be with loved ones, realize that it's normal to feel sadness and grief. It's OK to take time to cry or express your feelings. You can't force yourself to be happy just because it's the holiday season.

Reach out. If you feel lonely or isolated, seek out community, religious or other social events. They can offer support and companionship. Volunteering your time to help others also is a good way to lift your spirits and broaden your friendships.

Be realistic. The holidays don't have to be perfect or just like last year. As families change and grow, traditions and rituals often change as well. Choose a few to hold on to, and be open to creating new ones.

Plan ahead. Set aside specific days for shopping, baking, visiting friends and other activities. Plan your menus and then make your shopping list.

The Benefit Of Prayer

So, if you need more strength to face life, if you want to be more like God, or if you want to develop a closer relationship with the most amazing Being in the universe -- prayer is your answer.

Don't worry about knowing the right words or being formal. Just talk to God as you would to a well-respected friend.
